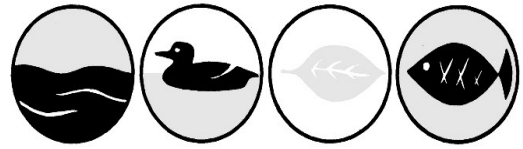

October 2022 Newsletter

For the September Nature Night we had no attendance. Vincent Mosca of Hey and Associates, Inc. shared the following information on Pollinators and Open Spaces. We hope to have Vince back again next year.

The Great Lakes region encompasses eastern Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Ohio, northern Pennsylvania, and most of western and central New York. Within this area lies vast tallgrass prairies, sprawling wetlands, and mixed broadleaf forests. These communities are home to an impressive diversity of butterflies, including the northern migratory population of the monarch butterfly, which depends on the floral resources available within these habitats for its survival.



Each spring, monarchs leave overwintering sites in coastal California and the mountains of central Mexico and fan out across North America to breed and lay eggs on milkweed, the monarch's host plant. Several generations are produced over the course of the spring and summer. In late summer and early fall, adults migrate back to the overwintering sites, where they generally remain in reproductive diapause until the spring, when the cycle begins again.

Monarchs at overwintering sites in Mexico and California have declined dramatically since monitoring began in the late 1990s. Across their range in North America, monarchs are threatened by a variety of factors. Loss of milkweed from extensive herbicide use has been a major contributing factor and habitat loss and degradation from other causes, natural disease and predation, climate change, and widespread insecticide use are probably also contributing to monarch declines. Because of the monarch's migratory life cycle, it is important to protect and restore habitat across their entire range. Adult monarchs depend on diverse nectar sources for food during all stages of the year, from spring and summer breeding to fall migration and overwintering. Caterpillars, on the other hand, are completely dependent on their milkweed host plants. Inadequate milkweed and nectar plant food source at any point may impact the number of monarchs that successfully arrive at overwintering sites in the fall.

How we can help is to provide milkweeds and other nectar-rich flowers that bloom where and when monarchs need them is one of the most significant actions you can take to support monarch butterfly populations. Vincent provided a list of Great Lakes native plants that have documented monarch visitation, bloom during times of year when monarchs are present, are commercially available, and are known to be hardy. The species are well suited for wildflower gardens, urban greenspaces, and farm field borders. Beyond supporting monarchs, many of these plants attract other nectar pollen seeking butterflies, bees, moths, and hummingbirds, and some are host plants for other butterfly and moth caterpillars. Vince left several copies of the Great Lakes monarch nectar plants guide and packets of Wild Flower seeds at the club house for those of you interested in helping restore healthy habitat in Illinois
